None of these would provide (certainly in the initial stages) the income levels we are used to, however, could put the municipality and Rotary on the map and provide some cultural development opportunity to the area.

**The Club will be conducting a forum on the 14<sup>th</sup> September.**

Feedback from this will then be evaluated and a questionnaire will be circulated to gauge individual interest and commitment.

ShelterBox is providing emergency disaster relief in Indonesia after the country was struck by a powerful earthquake. Measuring 7.3 in magnitude, reports from Indonesia's National Disaster Management Body (BNPB) estimate more than 200,000 people are seeking refuge and more than 50,000 homes have been damaged or destroyed by the earthquake in West Java. Fourteen regions within Java have been severely affected by this earthquake.

Australian ShelterBox Response Team (SRT) member Gary Bidner (Rotary Club of Goodna, Qld) as team leader was joined by UK SRT Andy Holland to assess and work with the local Rotary and Rotaract Clubs to ensure smooth clearances through Customs. The combined Rotary Clubs of Bandung and Jakarta are also home-hosting our SRT team and providing transport to the affected areas.

Gary Bidner, reporting from the village of Margamukti said: 'With assistance from Jakarta Rescue (the equivalent of our SES), Rotarians and an enthusiastic group of Rotaractors, we have supplied 40 ShelterBox disaster relief tents to displaced families. Our fellow Rotarians are also providing first aid and food distribution – putting smiles on many faces.'

The ShelterBox SRT will soon be joined by additional members from New Zealand and Canada. ShelterBox aid to assist more than 9,000 survivors is being transported to Indonesia and our SRT's will continue to assess the need.
